## 2<sup>nd</sup> Thessal onians (Chapter 2:1-12)

This chapter continues with the theme of Jesus' 2<sup>nd</sup> coming. Obviously, this topic remains a great concern for the Thessalonian church and for Paul.



What was Paul afraid that the church might have believed?

How could they possibly have bought such a lie?

What did Paul say would have to happen first?

What would the traits of the "man of lawlessness" be?

What events would surround his appearance?

Who is this man of lawlessness? There is much debate by reputable scholars, and far be it from me to give a definitive answer. Yet, the most popular views are as follows:

- The Roman emperor(s)
- The Papacy
- Some, yet to come, political figure


Most commentators suggest that "the man of lawlessness" corresponds with a single "antichrist" that will wreak havoc on the earth before or during a period of tribulation just prior to Jesus' return in final judgment. However,  $2^{nd}$  Thessalonians 2:7 states that the secret power of lawlessness was <u>already</u> at work and the Thessalonians <u>knew</u> what was keeping it in check at that present time.

This seems to indicate that "the man of lawlessness" was someone or something present in the middle of the first century.\* This would certainly rule out a single "Tribulation Antichrist." The Expositor's Bible Commentary also observes that this text has enough affinities with 'the beast' of Revelation 13 that the two books almost certainly describe the same period.

Why does verse 10 say those who are deceived will perish?

What was God going to send to the unbelievers - and why?

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How important is it for us to identify the man of lawlessness?

What does it mean for someone to "love the truth"- and how is it connected to salvation?

If God cannot lie, why would He - in fact how could He - send delusions?
